Easter Eggstravaganza

Easter activities that don't use (many) real eggs. Use as many ideas as your child is interested in. Most can be done over a few days so don't try to squeeze them all into one day.

Description: Use glue and sharpies for a faux stained glass craft. Trace, dry, color, cut, hang.

Materials: Printable template, black acrylic paint, white school glue, sharpies, some clear plastic (page protector, laminating sheet, clam shell), sharpies.

Note: Puffy paint works in place of glue + paint. Black glitter glue worked but peels off the plastic too easily. I tried Acrylic paint and that worked in place of sharpie.

Description: Watch what happens to an egg after a day in vinegar. Then the same egg goes in corn syrup. Lastly it gets a colorful dip. The site will offer up a detailed description and explanation, adjust accordingly for your audience.

Materials: 1 egg (brown is best), white vinegar, corn syrup, water, optional: food coloring, glass/jar, tray with sides.

Grow Crystals in an Egg


Description: You'll grown salt crystals in an egg shell. Using epsom salt makes the crystals appear more quickly. The glue helps the salt stick and grow crystals over a wider surface area. The food coloring is optional. Crystals should grow overnight.

Note: You do boil the water to dissolve the epsom salt and pour warm/hot liquid into the egg shell. Plan accordingly to let the egg shell have a sturdy holder so your child can pour if

possible. This can likely be as simple as a nest you make with a rolled up towel. The author notes that mugs with handles work great for stirring, I think small glass liquid measuring cups would be awesome as they have a spout.

Language Work: Crack & Write Eggs

Description: For this activity a list of spelling words is used. The parents writes a word on paper, cuts up the word so each letter is separate. Places it into the egg. Hide the eggs or let your child pick them from a basket. They open the egg, arrange the word, roll the dice, write the word as many times as the dice indicates.

Variations:

- Take a small puzzle and put a piece in each egg. Let the child open and assemble as they find the egg.
- If your child enjoys writing lists/copying words, write a word on a slip of paper, give them paper to copy the word onto after they open the egg. Be thematic or ask them for a list of words.
- Put a picture of an item in the egg, have them spell and write it on their own.

Cutting Practice

I am attaching some Easter themed cutting strips. Cut the strips to make a collage or Easter card.

Use the dotted ones with a page protector or picture frame and dry erase marker for tracing practice. Or as intended and cut along the dotted lines.
